





Listening to the Stars: The Constellation Model of Collaborative Social Change (Social Space, 2008)

Collective Impact Model is a framework to tackle deeply entrenched and complex social problems



- Common Agenda
- Common understanding of the problem
- Shared vision for change
- Shared Measurement
- Collecting data and measuring results
- Focus on performance management
- Shared accountability
- Mutually Reinforcing Activities
- Differentiated approaches
- Coordination through joint plan of action
- Continuous Communication
- Consistent and open communication
- Focus on building trust
- Backbone Support
- Separate organization(s) with staff
- Resources and skills to convene and coordinate participating organizations

What are the ingredients that make this work?

Collaboration refers to the engagement of people in order to create relationships conducive for solving complex issues with plausible solutions for which they take responsibility – and catalyze their contributions and assets into collective action.

Relationships move at the **Speed of Trust**.


Creating **Social Change** moves at the **Speed of Relationships**.

Break these rules and the work moves backwards exponentially faster than you can imagine.

Enter COVID – and a new sense of urgency

- What we KNEW was that many of the pressures associated with COVID are exasperated by the pre-COVID conditions for many who are made vulnerable by poverty.
- So we asked the 175+ community partners if they wanted us to host a conversation about COVID
- AND they did. But also, they had existing relationships, trusted the convening leadership and saw the common vision.

Funding portal

Partnership with the Saskatoon Community Foundation and United Way.

Agency based resource sharing, staff secondments and collective leveraging



Supply Chain

Research team, procurement, warehousing, distribution (delivery/pick up)

We also received many donations – that were sorted, classified and allocated to community



Communication

Team leads – regular check ins, 401 forms, data collection, reporting, allocation decisions, research and planning for the next thing.

Adequate and appropriate shelter for all

Need for self isolation spaces, discharge to homelessness, funding for shelters, access to housing stock, intensive case management, harm reduction, mental health and substance use supports



24/7 supports (and Cold Weather Strategy)

Winter + COVID was hard for many – it shone a light on how limited the capacity is in Saskatoon to support folks on the street when it is cold.



Vaccine Roll Out

Inclusion of the service agencies as health workers, homeless population in Phase 1, mobile testing/vaccine options for hard to reach residents

Inter-Agency Response Funding

Recognizing the immediate need for resources in our community, local funders stepped up to the plate and provided the necessary funds to start and sustain SIRC from March 2020 to March 2022.

Without this funding, organizations in Saskatoon serving the vulnerable population would have faced additional barriers, including safety.

Funders provided over \$1 million dollars to SIRC

(via the City of
Saskatoon) provided
funding and financial
logistics to SIRC.



We leveraged our social capital with existing relationships to talk differently about funding models. Community led the priorities, community decisions informed funding models and the funders came through with incredible resources.

We trusted each other and understood the common goal.

Of the total money spent by SIRC, 41% of it (\$338,230)went towards supplying PPE and other critical supplies (e.g., bleach). An additional 36% of all funding was spent on food items and the IC & community contract.

Pivot away from COVID



The SPRP partners gathered to re-energize the work around the 12 Bold Ideas to Eliminate Poverty – 165 registered for a full day meeting.

We trust each other, understand the common goal and see our individual place in the collective action. We are better together.
